#### 01.03.15 Territorial Acknowledgement

J-P. Boudreau noted the change in the agenda item from 'land acknowledgment' to 'territorial acknowledgment', and indicated that there is now an official territorial acknowledgment written by Elders and the Indigenous Advisory Circle. He read it as follows:

We would like to acknowledge that we are located within the territory of Mi'kma'ki, the unceded, ancestral territory of the Mi'kmaq. Our relationship and our privilege to live on this territory was agreed upon in the Peace and Friendship Treaties of 1752. Because of this treaty relationship it is to be acknowledged that we are all Treaty people and have a responsibility to respect this territory.

This acknowledgment is to be read at all official Mt.A. events. The Chair noted, from consultation with Elders and the IAC, that it is acceptable to offer an acknowledgment spoken from the heart, but if one is not comfortable doing this then best practice is to read the official acknowledgment. The Chair said a communication to the campus community about this is forthcoming.

02.03.15 Approval of agenda

#### 04.03.15 Business arising from the minutes

The Chair offered an update on the statement on divestment. He said Mt.A. has engaged Mercer to better understand what other Canadian universities are doing concerning divestment. Some initial observations: some have committed to divestment, some have committed to ESG principles, some are having discussions about investment management, and all take fiduciary and legal duties seriously. The Mercer study will review and form a best-in-class approach for Mt.A. The Chair is also in a working group of university presidents across the country on this matter.

# COVID-19

Yesterday there was a change toward dropping many COVID regulations in New Brunswick. Mt.A. will continue to stay with all COVID measures until April 30. There are 61 active cases reported, all are in contact and following protocol. The Chair issued a strong plea not to become complacent, but to stay the course, follow protocols, be mindful & look out for one another in the community.

# Enrollment

Applications and deposits look good, and we're tracking ahead of last year, and in some cases tracking ahead of 2019. The Chair congratulated everyone on a great Open House, with great faculty lectures and great engagement from students.

# Budget

The Budget Development Group is working on a post-COVID budget. There are far more requests than funds, which is always a challenge. The BDG is being strategic, mindful of supporting areas that have been historically under-supported. There is a strategic pathway to grow the institution and maintain a long-term sustainable budget. Some 'community conversations' about the budget will begin next week.

### Ukraine

The Chair referenced a statement emailed to the Mt.A. community on March 3<sup>rd</sup>, and reiterated that Mount Allison stands in solidarity with the people of Ukraine. He made note of the blue and yellow lighting on the PCCA sign at the edge of campus, and of the Ukraine flag now flying.

## Mountie Day

The Chair signaled the 8<sup>th</sup> annual Mountie Day coming up on March 31<sup>st</sup>, and he gave a shout out and thank-you to Town Council for their ongoing support of this initiative.

#### Events

The Chair signaled the continuing President's Speakers Series, Mountie Day on March 31<sup>st</sup>, the Class of '22 Last Lecture on April 7, and he looks forward to many forthcoming concerts and performances. The Chair noted that an announcement about Convocation is coming next week.

#### 06.03.15 Report from University Planning Committee

The Provost presented a brief oral report drawing attention to the recent external reviews. He has received a formal response from ENGL, which was highly positive, and is awaiting responses from WGST and PHYS/Aviation. His final report will include recommendations from those responses.

07.03.15 Motion from Experiential Learning Committee

# Motion (V. St. Pierre / C. Ionescu): That responsibility for approving and registering EXPL credit applications be assigned to the academic units aligned with the topic and supervision of the project.

#### **Motion carried**

V. St. Pierre explained that departments and programs would handle EXPL credits using the living document housing the EXPL definitions. This streamlines the process for students to get EXPL credits, it aligns with current practice for Independent Studies, and it has strong student support. J. Hennessy spoke in favour of the motion, noting that 2 years ago in his interview for the Provost position this was the only thing MASU asked him to fix. R. Minocha-McKenney spoke in favour of the motion because it makes EXPL credits more accessible. J.-P. Boudreau said this seems like a positive move that empowers students.

08.03.15 Report from Academic Matters, Regulations

Motion (J. Hennessy / C. Major): That Senate approve the described changes to Section 10 of the academic calendar pertaining to the A-Term (approved as part of the Strategic Academic Plan) and the changes to Section 10.3.6 for the 2022-23 Calendar.

#### 1 opposed

J. Hennessy noted that as part of the Strategic Academic Plan recently passed at Senate, Mt.A. will begin a pilot A-Term in August 2022. Thanks to those who proposed courses. This motion concerns changes to calendar regulation 10.3.6 concerning self-directed learning to accommodate the new A-Term.

D. Hamilton noted that in BIOL they've long done field work in the last week of August as part of courses for the Fall term, and asked whether they can still do this, or whether these will now need to be part of A-Term. J. Hennessy answered that A-Term was never intended to take away flexibility by replacing or interfering with initiatives already working like those in BIOL; so, any Fall courses that presently operate in the late days of August may continue to do so without changes. D. Hamilton asked a follow-up about calendar regulation 10.9.1.b concerning a date by which students have 20% of their total grade marked and returned to them, wondering how this applied in the A-Term. J. Hennessy said it makes sense for instructors to plan to have something graded and returned to students and 20% is the threshold.

# Motion (J. Hennessy / C. Major): That Senate approve the 2022-23 Calendar of Events and the provisional 2023-24 Calendar of Events.

Farooqi thanked the committee for being so instrumental and collaborative in getting things done for the Calendar.
